LOOK OUT FOR MOSQUITOES. Fortunately or unfortunately, the recent rains have put McAlester and other cities about here on the defensive, since every depression and exposed receptacle has been filled with water and afford ideal breeding places for mosquitoes.

These rains may be regarded as fortunate in this regard for the reason that they have called the attention of the citizens to the necessity of a sudden and despatch step, looking to the elimination of this dangerous nuisance.

Unless the citizens become alarmed over the situation, and do something, they may expect some such visitation of plague as is so graphically pictured in these words of the Fort Worth Record:

"The whole of North Texas has during the past two weeks been subjected to such torrential rains as have seldom occurred in the history of the state. Rivers and smaller streams have been brought to normal confines, and every depression has been transformed into a lake of greater or lesser size in which the water, unless active preventative measures be taken, will stand for weeks. The inevitable result will be such swarms of mosquitoes as to make the plague and its attendant horrors look like a holiday diversion.

It was long ago conclusively demonstrated that the mosquito, in which the malarial parasite is transmitted, and it is therefore necessary to the health and life of every community and neighborhood that prompt action be taken toward prevention, because care will be impossible. Patrolmen are necessary to prevent the mosquito from reaching the water, and the water, which is the breeding place, must be kept clean and free from any material which would prevent the water from getting out of the water and into the air, which is necessary for their life. The use of petroleum on all overflooded lands should be a matter for immediate attention. The warmth of a few days of sunshine will be sufficient to bring into existence hundreds of millions of the insects, and the prevention of their coming must inevitably be one in which fever and death will be distressingly prevalent to say nothing of the unspeakable torment a scourge of mosquitoes means to man and beast.

SMOKESTACKS. Continued from page One. here, and coal will be offered to factories at cost of mining. 'Fire water and fire sites will also be offered to factories. 'While a few miles of McAlester are in the way of smelter, stone, suitable for cement, and as it is a mixture of valuable qualities, it will be utilized for building purposes. Pulverized, it is a pure clay, suitable for pavers and hollow ware, sewer pipe and pottery. 'McAlester is nearer to eastern Texas and Gulf ports than any other city in the state, and as recent legislation of interstate-commerce-commerce laws says that the lesser the distance, the lesser must be the freight cost, McAlester can reach Texas and Gulf ports at 10 per cent cheaper freight rate than can a city 100 miles north, northeast or northwest. 'If the freight rate on iron ore from a year freight bill would save \$10,000,000, the freight rate on iron ore from McAlester would save \$10,000,000. 'McAlester is in an inland valley of an altitude from 550 to 800 feet above sea level, and is 100 miles from the gulf coast and makes it a very healthy location.
