CRONJE NOT CAUGHT

The Report That He Is Surrounded Has Not Been Confirmed.

MANY RUMORS ASY

Several British Officers Are Wounded Among the Number Being Gen. MacDonald - The Relief of Ladysmith Unconfirmed.

London, Feb. 22.—The war office declares it is unable to substantiate reports of the relief of Ladysmith. This does not prevent the public believing the queen has again forestalled the authorities at Pall Mall and sent to the public through the news columns, just as Tuesday she officially announced through Lord Cullin, commander of the militia, the tidings of Buller's success here. The war office was able to relieve impatient anxiety of the public. Nevertheless, as the queen's news are not actually quoted, official confirmation is eagerly awaited, especially Buller's dispatch Tuesday is regarded as foreshadowing the juncture of the White's forces in a short time. Interest and anxiety, therefore, are unceasingly and impatiently being maintained by Ladysmith and Bloemfontein.

The practical relief of the place is regarded as due more to a brilliant strategy in drawing the Boers than to Buller's numerical superiority, and the news of the result has been greeted with relief and satisfaction between Kitchener and Buller. It is expected to be confirmed with the announcement that Buller had reached his objective. The accomplishment of the latter is regarded with great interest on the ability of the general.

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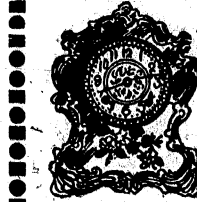

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OFFICERS SLAUGHTERED.

Boers Kill and Wound Many to Some Recent Battles.

London, Feb. 22.—Lord Roberts' list of the dead and wounded officers, including two generals, in the engagements up to Sunday, with no report as to casualties among noncommissioned officers and privates, staggers the public and causes anxiety, especially as in the officers' list, besides the losses of the Welsh and Essex regiments, not those of the British are included.

THE WORK OF THE CONVENTION.

The great history making day for the Indian Territory has come. The delegates who will help to make that history are here, the convention is on, and from this day will date great things in the future of this much tried land.

It is One of the Largest and Most Entertaining Ever Assembled in the Indian Territory.

Three Hundred Delegates Already Here, Best Scores of Visitors, and Many More to Follow on Later Trains.

PERMANENT ORGANIZATION PENDING

The big territorial convention is now in session in the opera house where above three hundred delegates from every phase of business and every condition of citizen or non-citizenship of this country are deliberating together upon what we shall do to be saved.

Soon after the arrival of the trains from the west the Chickasaw delegation held a caucus at the court room and discussed the measures to be introduced and urged from that section and all during the evening there was much interested discussion and many conferences among the delegates and visitors.
