A. H. Dreyfus, the Kansas City liquor salesman, who was sentenced by Judge Higgins of the county court to a term of 30 months in jail for taking orders for interstate shipments of liquor, in violation of the provisions of the Billings bill, through his attorneys, appealed his case to the supreme court yesterday.

It is contended that his arrest and conviction is a violation of the interstate commerce laws.

When Dreyfus was first arrested the appeal to the supreme court was granted by Judge Higgins for an injunction against Judge Higgins and the writ was denied. Amid wild cheering, which checked his utterances for moments at a time, Mr. Taft said:

"Mr. Bryan is greatly troubled about my attitude toward the trusts, and even more so by the statement that Mr. Rockefeller is for me. The Standard Oil were anxious to bring about my election. I should think that the last thing they would do would be to advertise in my support of me. Therefore, this publication, which Mr. Bryan is now making so much of, it seems to me has in it the slightest intimation to show that the Standard Oil, or any other trust, because I hoped for immunity from me, is supporting me. That is not the way those things are done."

Denies Standard Contribution. "There is a gentleman in your city (referring to Chairman Mack) with a most lively imagination, growing even livelier as the responsibilities of an inviter as the responsibility has conceived the idea that the Standard Oil contribute a large amount to the republican campaign funds. I am in a position to state with great emphasis that neither the Standard Oil nor any one connected with its management has contributed a single cent."

Brigadier General C. L. Edwards, United States army, said: "Rockefeller's announcement was a surprise to me. I talked with him one year ago today and he told me grandly admired Mr. Taft as a man, and I therefore, expected that he would vote for him."

BRYAN UNSAFE AND FLIGHTY

Men of South Who Think so Should Vote That Way and Not Stay in the Rut.

Richmond, Va., Oct. 30.—Before a large audience at the Academy of Music, Wednesday night, secretary of the party, Mr. Wright spoke on the issues of the campaign and in favor of the

candidate of Judge Watt. The meeting was held under the auspices of a number of men of prominence in this city, principally men of finance.

John Skelton Williams, formerly president of the Seaboard Air Line who introduced the subject, announced that he would vote for Judge Watt, saying that Virginia's new constitution has so purified the electorate as to remove all fears of the negro vote.

"In discussing what I regard to be a paramount issue to the American people in this campaign," said secretary Wright, "I have demonstrated to you my own satisfaction and I hope to yours that Mr. Bryan is not only not a demagogue himself, but that the doctrines which he has so persistently argued and in the soundness of which he so thoroughly believes are unimpeachable and tendentious and dangerous in the results. On the other hand it seems equally clear that while we may not fully agree with all of Judge Watt's views, on the whole they are honest and conservative and the interests of all the American people will be safe in his hands as President. If you agree with me in this conclusion, I ask if there is any good and sufficient reason why you and I should not vote as we think."

Wright declared that in his opinion the men in the south in public debate freely discuss political and financial. After they have the legal conditions, vitally affecting all considerations, to require their adherence to that democratic party. While these conditions no longer exist, the large majority of the substantial men of the south, he said, either from force of habit or prejudice, continued to vote the democratic ticket without reference to the merits. It repudiated the men it presented as candidates. This, he added, south locally, and in national politics the result has been still worse.

South Only Party Asset.

"The south has been treated," said he, "even in the councils of the democratic party, not as a dominant force as it should have been, but merely as a party asset representing just so many electoral votes. The policies of the past have been shaped by the suggestion of party leaders, not with reference to the real feelings or interests of the south, but to meet the supposed political exigencies of the East and West."

its natural aspects, but in that it has narrowed the horizons of the men of the south and caused them to look only at their own narrow interests, in which the common people of both sections have a common interest from a purely sectional standpoint. The only way in which they should have absolute control of their local affairs for more than thirty-five years. There is not the slightest disposition to be in any quarter at least in any responsible quarter—to interfere with them. A better understanding between the people of all sections would have been the result of those who formerly stood in hostile ranks have long since fraternized and become indeed citizens of the country. This has, however, been hindered about by closer business and social relations, with the result that there is a better insight and a more sympathetic understanding between the people of the north and the south and the fires of sectional prejudices have gone out and can never be rekindled.

Capital Turns to South.

Mr. Wright referred then to the great natural resources of the south and of the tide of immigration and the capital turning in that direction, while farmers it sought the east and west.

"Can any good reason be assigned," he remarked, "why in dealing in these questions we should not consider them from the standpoint of our own interests? Why should we blindly support doctrines which we believe injurious to us merely because some enterprising adventurer has sized the demagogic name and obtained publicity? I answer no. I am advising you to cease following men and measures which your sound and conscientious judgment repudiates. Let the man who honestly believes after investigation and the exercise of intelligent judgment that Mr. Bryan and Mr. Bryan's policies are conducive of good for himself and his neighbors, then let him be free to pursue and that is to vote for Mr. Bryan. It is equally clear that Mr. Bryan would make an unsafe and dangerous president, and that his policies, if carried into effect, would disorganize legitimate business, unemploy enterprise, throw labor out of employment and generally be disastrous to the country. I submit there is but one thing for him to do, and that is to vote against Mr. Bryan and vote for Judge Watt."

Mr. Wright declared there are tens of thousands of men in the south who regard Mr. Bryan as unsafe and dangerous, and who shudder at the thought of his election yet when asked to vote for him they feel themselves constrained to do so for him. He declared that such a course is neither good citizenship nor sound sense. He did not ask men to abandon their party simply because they did not like anything their own way, but to vote according to their conscience when they believe it would be disastrous to the real interests of the whole country to elevate Mr. Bryan to the presidency. He insisted that parties are not a means to an end and not an end itself.

"The real purpose of all parties," he said, "is to enable the voter to assist in bringing about the most efficient government for himself and his fellow citizens. In short I am protesting against the spirit of party, that spirit which makes one vote for his party right or wrong and which elevates the party above country."
