Magie McConville, of Alderson, is visiting friends here this week.

The average daily expenses for food of a man and wife and two children amount to about 35 cents. The average rent for two rooms is about \$2.50 a month. Ready-made clothing is cheap but shoes are expensive. Personal costs 50 per cent more than in the United States. The wages of a household servant per month, including board, range from \$2.14 for kitchen servants to \$9.52 for footmen.

In shipbuilding yards the weekly compensation ranges from \$2.95 for rivet heaters to \$9 for molders. Seamen's wages on coasting vessels, per month, are from \$4.29 for cabin boys to \$26.16 for the first mate. Captains of vessels are allowed 41 cents per day each officer and 29 cents for the balance of the crew with which "no land feed."

A German laborer says the Consul receives treble the wages paid in Germany, although the cost of food is from 10 to 50 per cent cheaper in the United States than in that country. Tea, in the quality for which we pay but 60 cents per pound, costs Germans \$1.65.

To Be Built Here.

The Cheatey, Oklahoma & Gulf Railroad has completed all arrangements for building its line west from Weatherford, Ok., to Amarillo, Tex. A large order for groceries was placed with a wholesale house at Oklahoma City, last week, and the company's graders will be put to work at once.

The line will, when completed, connect with the Beaver and Gulf Railroad, giving Cheatey, Oklahoma & Gulf a through route from Memphis, Tenn., to Denver, Colo.
